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Hong Kong has received increasing scholarly attention in recent years. Books, articles, and courses on Hong Kong history appear much more frequently than before. Why does Hong Kong matter in the studies of world history? How can we bring Hong Kong history into conversation with other world regions? What does it mean to be doing Hong Kong history in the UK and abroad? To conclude our programme in Lent 2024, we are organising a panel to examine Hong Kong in world history. Three PhD students will share with us their research on Hong Kong history. Through presentations and discussion, we hope to explore the role of Hong Kong in the twentieth-century world.
