Friday 12th February 2016

Alexander Korobko (Russian writer and film-maker): 'The DNA of Putin's Russia' (The presentation will include a short film on the assassination in London of Alexander Litvinenko, who visited the Seminar not long before his death)

Friday 19th February 2016

Peter Hennessy (Lord Hennessy of Lympsfield) and James Jinks will speak about Britain's nuclear submarine deterrent which is the the subject of a new book *The silent deep: the royal navy submarine service since 1945*

Friday 26th February 2016

Sir Simon Fraser KCMG (Permanent-Undersecretary at the FCO and Head of the Diplomatic Service: 2010-2015) will speak about "The National Security Council and the role of intelligence agencies in making foreign policy".

Sir Simon says: "I want to talk about how the NSC has worked over the last five years and how David Cameron uses it, drawing on examples such as Libya and Syria. And within that I want to look in particular at whether the composition of the Council and the creation of the National Security Secretariat is giving the Agencies too strong a voice in the policy process."
